

Facilitating Youth Sparks

Youth sparks are an essential ingredient of thriving. Having a spark or sparks gives a young person a sense of direction and encourages goal setting. Sparks are different from mere leisure activity in that:


- 1. **Sparks create actions** that not only contribute to the benefit of the young person, but also society at large;
- 2. **Sparks provide the intrinsic fuel** for a young person's growth in knowledge and skill;
- 3. **Sparks enhance a young person's networks** as he or she encounters others with similar sparks, particularly adults with expertise who can facilitate learning and opportunities for engagement.

Furthermore, sparks appear to be a protective factor for young people, helping to keep them on a positive track because of the young person's intense focus on the source of their spark. Sparks, in turn, motivate youth to succeed in other areas of their lives, such as personal, social, and academic.

Every young person has the potential to have a spark, and 4-H plays an important role in helping young people discover and pursue their sparks. In some cases, it is a matter of helping youth recognize their spark when the spark has already found

them!

Because of its emphasis on learning that is driven by a young person's interest, 4-H programs provide a rich context for youth to identify, explore, and sustain their personal interests, often resulting in the development of a young person's sparks. High quality youth program contexts, like those provided in 4-H are key for facilitating youth sparks. When sparks are facilitated through positive 4-H programs, youth are supported to grow and encouraged to overcome obstacles to reach their goals. Youth are also encouraged to share their spark with others and in this way, youth are empowered to develop their sparks and to use them to make the world a better place for all.



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


Idaho 4-H Livestock Skill-a-thon






4-H Policies & Procedures

Regular 4-H Clubs must meet the following requirements:

- Must have five members from no fewer than three families
- Must be organized with youth officers
- Must meet six or more times per year
- Must be supervised by one or more certified 4-H volunteers
- Must participate in at least 1 club service learning project

Volunteer training and certification will support the State 4-H policy regarding the 4-H Shooting Sports instructors in Idaho. The policy states that Idaho 4-H Shooting Sports instructors on the county level must meet the following requirements:

- Be at least 21 years of age (18 years for assistant instructors).
- Be screened, trained and appointed as a current 4-H Volunteer through their local County Extension Office.
- Successfully complete instructor discipline training administered/ sanctioned through University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development Office.
- Be trained and certified in any discipline(s) that they are teaching at the club/county level.
- Participants must attend the entire training and successfully complete all aspects to receive their respective discipline certificate.



ATTENTION VOLUNTEERS

Species, General Projects, and Leaders Council meetings are a vital part of our 4-H program's success. **ALL VOLUNTEERS** for Twin Falls County should be attending **at least** the Leaders Council meetings where every volunteer has a vote. If the volunteer is a leader of general projects or a specific species, the general project or species meetings should also be attended. Please encourage your teen 4-H members to attend as well!

Farm Service Agency Youth Loans

Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes loans to individual rural youth ages 10 through 20 to establish and operate income-producing projects of modest size in connection with their participation in 4-H Clubs, FFA, and similar organizations. Each project must be part of an organized and supervised program of work. The project must be planned and operated with the help of the organization adviser, produce sufficient income to repay the loan, and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience. These loans may be used to finance nearly any kind of income-producing project. Some common projects include livestock and crop production, lawn and garden services, repair shops, and roadside stands.

KNOW YOUR GOVERNMENT

Registration for the 2024 Know Your Government Conference is now open until January 8th. Know Your Government will be held February 17-19, 2024. This program is a great opportunity for 8th and 9th grade teens to learn more about their state legislative and judicial systems. Youth and volunteers interested will need to be enrolled in the current 4-H year with fees paid and an "active" status in ZSuite. Volunteers will have needed to complete minor protection training and background screen as well. Once enrolled in ZSuite, participants can register for KYG through ZSuite. The 2024 4-H Horsin' Around Camp is an indoor overnight event taking place at the Rupert Fairgrounds on February 2-3. This camp is for youth ages 8-18 (as of January 1, 2024) and youth do not need to be a current 4-H member to attend. The pre-registration deadline is January 26th and pre-registration is required to attend. The cost is \$30 for the first youth in a family and \$20 per additional youth; adults are \$10. Teens are encouraged to apply for counselor positions and that deadline is Friday, January 19.
